Dear friends

I wonder if you've come across this poem before, by A. E. Housman. It's a new one for me, and I stumbled across it quite by chance the other day.

The Lent Lily

'Tis spring; come out to ramble the hilly brakes around, for under thorn and bramble about the hollow ground the primroses are found.

IN WALES

And there's the windflower chilly with all the winds at play, and there's the Lenten lily that has not long to stay and dies on Easter day.

And since till girls go maying you find the primrose still, and find the windflower playing with every wind at will, but not the daffodil.

Bring baskets now, and sally upon the spring's array, and bear from hill and valley the daffodil away that dies on Easter day.

This slightly strange 5-line



verse is typical of Housman and it puts an extra emphasis on the last line of each verse to good effect. The Lent Lily is the daffodil, reminding us that although daffs are around at this time of year, they don't last very long and there's a narrow window for us to enjoy their beauty in all its bright, abundant, cheerful yellowness. Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Day, having died on Good Friday.

The juxtaposition of the final line, 'that dies on Easter day' is deliberate. Daffs don't all die on Easter Sunday, of course, but Housman's choice of day brings together nature and Christianity and invites us to acknowledge the dovetailing of the flower's death and short lifespan and Christ's rebirth and immortality.

Sadly, Housman lost his faith early. For him, Easter is about the death of daffodils, and perhaps the brevity of all life. With that view, there's no consolation to be gained from the Easter message.

But William Wordsworth's poem, 'I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud', itself a celebration of the joyous quality of

daffodils, offers a different story: it's as much a reminder that part of the joy of daffs lies in their being remembered long after they have been seen and admired.

I wandered lonely as a cloud that floats on high o'er vales and hills, when all at once I saw a crowd, a host, of golden daffodils; beside the lake, beneath the trees, fluttering and dancing in the

in vacant or in pensive mood, they flash upon that inward eye which is the bliss of solitude; and then my heart with pleasure fills,

For oft, when on my couch I lie

breeze

and dances with the daffodils.

I hope that all our local daffs are resplendent on Easter Sunday to trumpet the wonderful announcement of the Good News to the whole world, but perhaps we should also remember that, for Christians, Easter continues throughout the year, as does the Incarnation. Every time we come together to celebrate the Holy Eucharist, we remember all that Christ has done for us through his life, death and resurrection, and are given a glimpse of heaven. May the joy of the risen Lord be with you this Easter and may you remember long beyond. Alleluia ! Christ is risen!



UK Gov to introduce "Emergency Alerts" System

A siren-like alert will be sent to mobile devices (those connected to the 4G & 5G networks) across the UK next month (April) to test a new government public warning system. The test is expected to take place in the early evening of 23rd April.

Mobile device users will have to acknowledge the alert before they can use other features on their devices.

There are a couple of significant events to note for April. We have the Ministry Area Annual Vestry Meeting and the arrival of Bishop Mary to the Diocese.

The Annual Vestry meeting will be held on Sunday 30th April at St. Mary's Nolton. The meeting will begin with a Eucharist service at 10.00 A.M. followed by the main meeting. During the meeting officers may be appointed or elected to the Ministry Area Council for the coming year or as necessary. If elections are needed, don't forget you will need to be enrolled on the electoral register before the meeting in order to take part. Forms to register will be available in all our Churches shortly. Look out for them.

Bishop Mary will be with us on Saturday 29th April. We, as a Ministry Area have already submitted a Ministry Area Profile for the Bishop to consider ahead of her arrival. Along with all the other Ministry Areas in the Diocese we are invited to make a contribution to a welcoming gift for Bishop Mary. A service of welcome will be held at the Cathedral at 12noon on Saturday 29th April when the gift will be presented. The welcome service is open to all, just turn up on the day.

The Coronation of King Charles will take place on Saturday 6th May. The whole event will be televised by the BBC with a Bank holiday granted on Monday 8th May. (This is in addition to the May Bank holiday which falls on Monday 1st May.) Should anyone be organising a suitable Coronation event of any sort, especially for the Bank Holiday Monday, you may like to consider sharing it with the whole of the Ministry Area through our Facebook page maybe.

All we need now is some friendly spring weather.

Bridgend County Borough Council News

Demolition soon to start on former police station

Demolition of the former police station in Bridgend town centre is due to start soon with the site earmarked to house a new Bridgend College campus.



The contractors Cardiff Demolition are due to begin demolition in the week beginning Monday 20 March with work expected to take up to 12 weeks. Access to Cheapside and local businesses will be maintained during the demolition, although there will be some temporary narrowing of the carriageway and minor alterations to pedestrian crossing points. The contractor will be contacting local businesses before demolition starts to advise on the programme of works.

The site, at Cheapside, forms a significant part of Bridgend County Borough Council's regeneration plans for the town centre.

Once the building is demolished, the site, together with the former Cheapside multi-storey car park site will be leased to Bridgend College, enabling the relocation of the Cowbridge Road campus to the new town centre location. The college plan to create a net-zero carbon building, with 21st century learning and teaching facilities for post-16 education in Bridgend, with community benefits including a 200-seat theatre space, a coffee shop and flexible meeting spaces.


It represents a £50 million investment into the skills and training of the young people in Bridgend and members of the community who need opportunities to retrain and gain valuable employability skills. This investment is part funded by the Welsh Government's Sustainable Communities for Learning programme.

Cabinet Member for Regeneration Cllr Neelo Farr said: "The new college campus which will cater for at least 1,000 staff and students will be a catalyst for the wider regeneration in the area, increasing footfall and supporting local businesses. "Meanwhile our plans for developing enhanced public transport will make it easier for people to access its facilities."

Council budget 2023-24: What it means for finance and resources

Budget proposals for 2023-24 have been endorsed by the Cabinet of Bridgend County Borough Council to ensure the local authority can continue to provide essential services and meet some of the most difficult challenges that it has ever faced.



He said: "This budget has been set against a backdrop of huge increases in demand for essential council services, an unavoidable need to make savings of £2.6m, a massive 10 per cent rise in inflation, increasing difficulties in sourcing materials and resources including staff, and the ongoing impact of the cost of living crisis upon us all.

"The council is not immune to any of this, and while householders have been rightly concerned about pressing issues such as rising food and energy bills or how they can afford to heat their homes, the same issues have affected our day centres for adults, our homes for looked-after children, our residential care facilities and more.

When you consider that we have already covered a £72m shortfall since 2010-11, setting a fully balanced budget which enables us to meet these increased costs while also continuing to provide important services has been truly challenging.

What we have done is to finely-tune this budget, making sure it is as fair as possible to the taxpayer while also remaining realistic and fit for purpose, all while focusing upon maintaining the ongoing health, safety and wellbeing of the people we serve."

To help guide their decision-making, Cabinet developed a set of principles outlining their aims which have underpinned the budget – to protect the most vulnerable people in local communities, to focus upon preserving and protecting services by limiting growth for the coming financial year, to review all budgets and identify savings, to prioritise reductions against back office functions, to anticipate future budget pressures, and to consider whether schools are able to contribute towards the overall savings after having been protected from cuts for more than a decade.

Councillor Williams said: "In addition to applying these principles, we have learned from best practice at other local authorities, have both lobbied for and received a fair settlement from Welsh Government, and have taken the proposals through multiple meetings of the all-parties Budget Research And Evaluation Panel, the scrutiny committee process, Corporate Management Board, a wide-ranging public consultation and more.

All of this has resulted in a gross revenue budget of £485m, a net budget of £342m and a capital investment programme of £69m. At 4.9 per cent, we have kept council tax as low as possible, reducing it down from the previously suggested 6 per cent in order to fund additional budget pressures and cover a funding shortfall of £8m.

This works out as being the equivalent of an extra £1.50 a week for an average Band D property. We have also been able to avoid proposed cuts for home-to-college transport, fly-tipping enforcement and the Royal National Lifeboat Institution while investing money such as £1.8m for upgrading children's play areas, £1.75m on grants to provide disabled facilities in people's homes, £1m on refurbishing local highways and much more."

Cllr Williams also addressed two of the most commonly asked questions around the issue of setting the council budget.

He said: "We are often asked why we do not use council reserves when faced with having to make cuts, but the clue really is in the name - it is money which has already been reserved for specific purposes, and which is subject to regular audit to ensure that it is maintained at the right level. Similarly, while some have suggested that the council gains extra revenue by charging council tax on new housing developments, this isn't true – before providing councils with their funding allocations for the year, Welsh Government first deducts the amount of council tax that each area is expected to raise."

Council steps in to improve traffic issues related to Welsh Water works

Bridgend County Borough Council has stepped in to ask Dŵr Cymru Welsh Water to suspend works in Tondu due to traffic issues caused by the installation of a new water main.

The works are taking place at the Maesteg Road (A4063) traffic lights junction in Tondu and are being delivered by Welsh Water. Despite significant efforts from Welsh Water and the council, the temporary traffic management system led to congestion on the morning of the 27th February.

The council has since asked Welsh Water to suspend the works, whilst a more suitable solution is found.

Due to the nature of the works, it is impossible to avoid clashing with peak times but all options are being explored to keep any unavoidable disruption to a minimum.

Over 30 Warm Hubs set to receive grant funding

Over 30 groups and community centres in Bridgend County Borough are set to receive grant funding as they continue to open up warm spaces for people to get together.



The Warm Hubs Grant Scheme which is open for applications until the fund runs out is being administered by the Bridgend Association of Voluntary Organisations (BAVO). Grants of up to £2,000 are available for community centres, groups, facilities, as well as not-for-profit enterprises. The funds are to support new or existing warm spaces, where people can come together, participate in activities, and connect. It is being funded by Welsh Government.

<u>Eligible groups can apply for a grant via BAVO's website</u>. The grants panel meets twice a week to ensure a quick turnaround for applicants.
