Dear friends

Our last combined MA service on 30th July was a wonderful occasion with all 8 of our churches represented. In spite of the unseasonably chilly, windy and damp weather and many people being away on holiday, we had an excellent number in attendance and the singing/organ was especially rousing (Thank you to



our organist, John!). It's so uplifting for everyone to come together to worship and enjoy fellowship with one another, but I fully appreciate that everyone has their 'home' church and feels a sense of loyalty to that special place. Having two stipendiary priests now doesn't make our rota any easier, nor does it mean that there will be more services, it just means that our 'retired' clergy angels can have a break. Two priests can conduct two Sunday morning services (plus baptisms) leaving four churches either to have a Licensed Lay Minister to conduct the service (when available) or the local lay team. We are completely blessed that every church has members who are more than able to take a gentle lead, announce notices, read the lessons, compile and deliver prayers and choose hymns. Where a service is led by a team, there are no restrictions on who can participate on it, so please put yourself forward to your lay representative if you feel moved to help. Where there is no priest or lay minister, Roger or I will supply a sermon to be read.

Hopefully the pattern of services will settle quickly into this new, sustainable pattern. There will always be 4 Eucharists available and if a lift is needed to get you to a different church from your usual, all you have to do is ask.

Although we're entering into the season of mellow fruitfulness, the winter months will be with us before we know it and I'm afraid that we are faced once again with exorbitant, crippling fuel costs. To that end, although the churches will remain open for Sunday and Wednesday services, you will need to rug up. I'll look into having some blankets available at each church for those who feel the chill keenly. If you have some spare ones to offer, please do!

But there's still some summer warmth to enjoy - at least, there should be! If you're returning

from holiday now, I hope you've had a relaxing and enjoyable time, but if you're taking a late break in September, travel safely and see you soon.


Ministry Area Prayer

A Rocha UK's Easy Eco Tips August

Help birds in hot weather. Keeping your bird bath topped up with fresh water in warmer weather can be a life saver for our feathered friends. Get your garden birds through a heatwave when natural supplies, like worms, become scarce, by putting out supplementary food -

black sunflower seeds, pinhead oatmeal, soaked sultanas, raisins and currants, mealworms, waxworms and good seed mixture.

September

Green your home this Autumn. Tackle climate change and reduce your heating bill by testing how draughty

or leaky your home is. Find the gaps that let the cold air in and warm air out (think keyholes, letterboxes, gaps around the edges or bottoms of windows and doors, loft hatches, floorboards etc.) and fix these gaps using the correct materials: (there are lots of handy tutorials on how to do this online). Now is also a very good time to prepare for winter by sticking tinfoil or radiator panels between the wall and radiator, as these will help reflect heat back into your room during the colder months.

A Rocha - IPCC update

The most recent Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report dropped the news that global average temperature rise is now almost certain to exceed 1.5 degrees, with profound consequences for wildlife and people.



The IPCC has been carrying out a comprehensive five-year assessment on the subject. In March, they released their last report of the assessment, a 32-page summary of which can be read here. The finding that grabbed the headlines was this: 'Global warming of 1.5°C and 2°C will be exceeded during the 21st century unless deep reductions in CO2 and other greenhouse gas emissions occur in the coming decades'. The small print says we'll probably bust through 1.5°C before the end of this decade.

We are failing to 'keep 1.5 alive', which was the chief aim of the UN climate negotiations in Glasgow in 2021.

There is no disguising the utterly devastating blow this will be to nature and people, in terms of everything from habitat loss, flooding, droughts, extreme weather events, disrupted food supplies and sea level rise, forcing the abandonment of many coastal areas and low-lying islands.

Many of us will have noted the impact of last summer's unprecedented heatwave in our own gardens and local parks, including tree deaths from extreme heat. And that was at 'just' 1.1-2 degrees above the global average. The report notes that already: 'Hundreds of local losses of species have been driven by increases in the magnitude of heat extremes'. And 'Impacts [of temperature rise] on some ecosystems are approaching irreversibility...'.

So, what should we do? The first thing is to shout from the rooftops that every fraction of a degree counts. 1.5 degrees may now be beyond us, but stopping at 1.55 or 1.6 would avoid many more extinctions and human deaths than stopping at 1.7 degrees, never mind the cataclysmic 2.4+ which the world is currently on track for. The 2015 Paris Agreement was to keep temperature rise 'below 2 degrees and as close to 1.5 as possible'.

Secondly, we must be crystal clear about the causes of human-induced climate change and redouble efforts to halt them. The report states that 'In 2019, approximately 79% of global greenhouse gas emissions came from the sectors of energy, industry, transport and buildings together and 22% from agriculture, forestry and other land use'. Burning fossil fuels remains the single biggest source of emissions. Getting our economies off fossil fuels, therefore, is the overriding priority.

We must also preserve our natural carbon sinks, from the Amazon rainforest to our remaining UK woodlands, grasslands and wetlands, establish new ones, switch to climate-and-biodiversity-friendly farming, plant trees and open new greenspaces in our towns and cities.

Finally, as Christians, we should use every tool God gives us to accelerate the right action for His creation – nature and people. Pray for change, for our faith to sustain us in concerning times. Use our power as consumers, for example, by switching our household electricity to a 100% renewable energy supplier. And critically – and entirely free – use our voice and vote to urge local and national politicians to use their much greater powers – to sign international agreements, pass laws, levy taxes, use the national budget to accelerate the right actions – to 'keep as close as possible to 1.5 degrees'.

No responsible person could welcome the news that we're on track to cross a thick red climate line in the next few years. But as Christians, it is a thunderous call for collective witness to our loving creator God, through our prayers, our actions, and our petitions to leaders.



Cabinet approves early transfer of land to Bridgend College

Bridgend County Borough Council's Cabinet has approved the early transfer of land to Bridgend College to secure the new town centre campus.



As part of a 'master' planning programme which aims to regenerate Bridgend town centre over the next ten years, the proposed college development will be built on the former South Wales Police Station and Brackla One multi storey car park at Cheapside.

The demolition of the police station took place in June, and the removal of the multi storey car park is set to be completed by April 2024, with tenders just being issued.

The demolition of the car park poses challenges surrounding the structure of the building, as well as its proximity to the mainline rail network, Asda and Aldi. Network Rail will need to provide permission, and appropriate indemnity insurance should be in place, prior to work beginning on the car park.

In a meeting earlier this week, the council's Planning Committee approved the proposals for the college. Set to open in September 2025, the campus will encompass two new buildings at Cheapside that will provide exceptional teaching and learning facilities, including a theatre, hair and beauty salons, recording and dance studios, design workshops and more.

The project will offer a net-zero carbon building, with community benefits including a 200-seat theatre space, a coffee shop and flexible meeting spaces. The initiative also meets Welsh Government's 'Town Centre First' policy for public investment.

The campus is in a highly sustainable location in the town centre, close to bus and train stations. In line with the National Planning Policy, the council will be taking measures to take advantage of this location and will promote active travel, as well as the use of sustainable means of transport.

Simon Pirotte, Principal and Chief Executive Officer of Bridgend College, said: "This is an exciting and important milestone in our ambition to deliver a sustainable twenty-first century learning and skills centre in the heart of the county borough. It is an ambitious and complex project, representing a substantial investment into the regeneration of Bridgend town centre. The new campus will provide a diverse range of training, apprenticeships, up-skilling, and higher-level skills development to support businesses and the economy here in Wales."

Cllr Rhys Goode, Cabinet Member for Housing, Planning and Regeneration, said: "The location of the new campus promises to contribute significantly to the economy of Bridgend town centre - daily student and staff footfall in the town will most certainly boost local businesses. With its close proximity to Pen-y-Bont train station and bus station, there are considerable opportunities to promote active travel and the use of public transport to the site, helping us to reach our net-zero carbon target. We are hugely excited by this development and what it will offer to Bridgend town centre, as well as the wider county borough area."

New food waste recycling campaign launches to drive more households into action

Bridgend County Borough Council has wrapped five collection vehicles as part of a wide-spread campaign to boost household food waste recycling participation throughout the county borough.

Using existing 'Be Mighty. Recycle' creative artwork, the vehicles have been wrapped in imagery highlighting the RIDGENT (Power of Food Waste' and how food waste can be recycled into climate change-fighting renewable energy in Wales.

The local authority was awarded grant funding for the vehicle wrapping and other campaign materials, as part of a nation-wide campaign from WRAP Cymru and Welsh Government to improve its recycling rates, thereby supporting the Welsh Government's goal of becoming a zero-waste nation by 2050 and for Wales to become the no.1 recycling nation in the world. The 7,601 tonnes of the food waste collected from homes in Bridgend County Borough is recycled locally at an anaerobic digestion plant in Stormy Down that is used first to generate electricity to power local homes before being ploughed back into the food chain as organic fertiliser (6,080 tonnes*), which will be applied to around 3,000 acres of nearby farmland.

Cabinet Member for Climate Change and the Environment, Cllr John Spanswick said: "We are pleased to secure this funding from Wrap Cymru and Welsh Government, and to be able to participate in the 'Be Mighty. Recycle' campaign, which has been called Wales' most ambitious recycling campaign to date. The five collection vehicles look fantastic and are certain to capture the attention of residents across the county borough. We hope this awareness campaign will encourage those households who are not yet participating in our food recycling collections service to do so."

Consultation on draft housing and homelessness strategy given go ahead by Cabinet

Bridgend County Borough Council's Cabinet has approved the launch of a public consultation on a draft four-year plan to tackle the national housing and homelessness crisis in the county borough.

The council's draft 'Housing Support Programme 2022-2026' strategy identifies key priorities for the council and BRIDGEND its partners, in the delivery of homelessness prevention and other housing related support services. These priorities have been developed following a substantial review of these services and in consultation with partner organisations and key stakeholders. As the housing authority for Bridgend County Borough, the council is legally required to have a homelessness strategy. While there is no legal need for a housing strategy, there is a strong correlation between housing, homelessness, and rough sleeping.

According to a report presented to the Council's Cabinet, figures provided showed that over the last four years, homelessness applications have increased by 25 per cent. In 2020/21, (the first year of the pandemic), the council saw a record number of people presenting as homeless, with 1,612 applications received in that year alone. Added to this, the number of temporary accommodation placements has increased by a massive 251 per cent, since 2019.

There are currently around 485 people, from 260 households in temporary accommodation (as of end of June 2023). With the number of households on the common housing register increasing by 212 per cent between March 2020 and February 2023. And as of July 2023, there are 2,629 households on the common housing register, with almost 60 per cent of applicants waiting for a one-bedroom property.

Cllr Rhys Goode, Cabinet Member for Housing, Planning and Regeneration, said: "These figures make for stark reading, and combined with the rapidly rising cost of living means we need to find joined up answers to tackle the housing crisis in what is already a challenging financial climate for the authority. Our draft strategy will help us work more effectively towards meeting these challenges. With the needs of households becoming more complex and time critical, the demand for affordable housing and support services is unprecedented. "The draft strategy sets out how we will collaborate with our partners and third sector services to ensure homelessness is rare, brief and unrepeated. The scale of the challenge ahead should not be underestimated. However, with the continued commitment to our strategic priorities and with the development of the new 'Rapid Rehousing' approach to homelessness we hope to make a real change within our community."

A 12-week public consultation will go live shortly, and all members of the community are encouraged to participate, with more details to follow. In the meantime, anyone who is threatened with an eviction notice is urged to notify the council as soon as possible, to ensure early intervention, and a speedy solution is provided.
